MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR



As Chairman of the Board of Directors of the CIRLM, I am pleased to present the Institute's annual report for 2023–2024. For over twenty years, the CIRLM has contributed to the development and dissemination of knowledge specific to official language minority communities. To reassert its mission, the CIRLM has renewed its strategic plan for the next five years, from 2023 to 2028. The renewal of this plan coincides with the Government of Canada's modernization of the Official Languages Act, and the implementation of its new Action Plan for Official Languages 2023–2028. The Institute will therefore be closely monitoring the federal government's official languages measures and their impact on communities, while continuing to produce evidence-based data on a range of OLMC issues.

To this end, four main pillars now guide the strategic plan of the CIRLM: 1) research watch, 2) production of new knowledge, 3) dissemination of results in academic, community and government environments; and 4) collaborative research and co-production of knowledge with OLMC researchers and community and government partners. The new strategic plan also positions the organization to adopt a more inclusive approach (EDI-D) with regard to under-represented groups within Canadian society and OLMCs. The CIRLM also revised its areas of research to bring them more into line with recurring and new issues that are redefining—and indeed increasing the complexity of—challenges in a number of fields, including education (early childhood to postsecondary education), health, immigration, identity and culture.

In addition to these improvements, the CIRLM continues to carry out projects relevant to OLMCs. For example, a three-year project was completed on the evaluation of community school projects across Canada under the Vice-Versa program. This project demonstrated how collaboration between the school and associations in the Canadian Francophonie could generate positive benefits for students in terms of language skills and identity building. Statistical portraits, such as the one on the female population of Prince Edward Island, are examples of projects integrating an EDI-D approach and contributing to the decisionmaking of the organizations commissioning these studies.

As you read through this annual report, you will appreciate the diversity of the projects carried out by a team committed to working with our partners and collaborators in government and the community. For this reason, I would like to congratulate the entire team at the Institute for the outreach they have made possible by disseminating this knowledge and, above all, for their contribution to better addressing the needs of OLMCs.

To name but a few, one of these projects examines the challenges and hopes of the next Congrès mondial acadien, another analyzes the impact of the anglicization of research on Francophone and bilingual scientific journals, and yet another looks at citizen participation in the governance of Francophone minority communities. I would also like to highlight the publication of an issue of the journal *Minorités linguistiques et société/Linguistic Minorities and Society* to mark the 20th anniversary of the CIRLM and the 10th anniversary of the journal, as well as the symposium of QUESCREN researcher-members, *Strength in Communities: Exploring Social and Cultural Landscapes of English-Speaking Quebec*, in which I participated in May 2023.

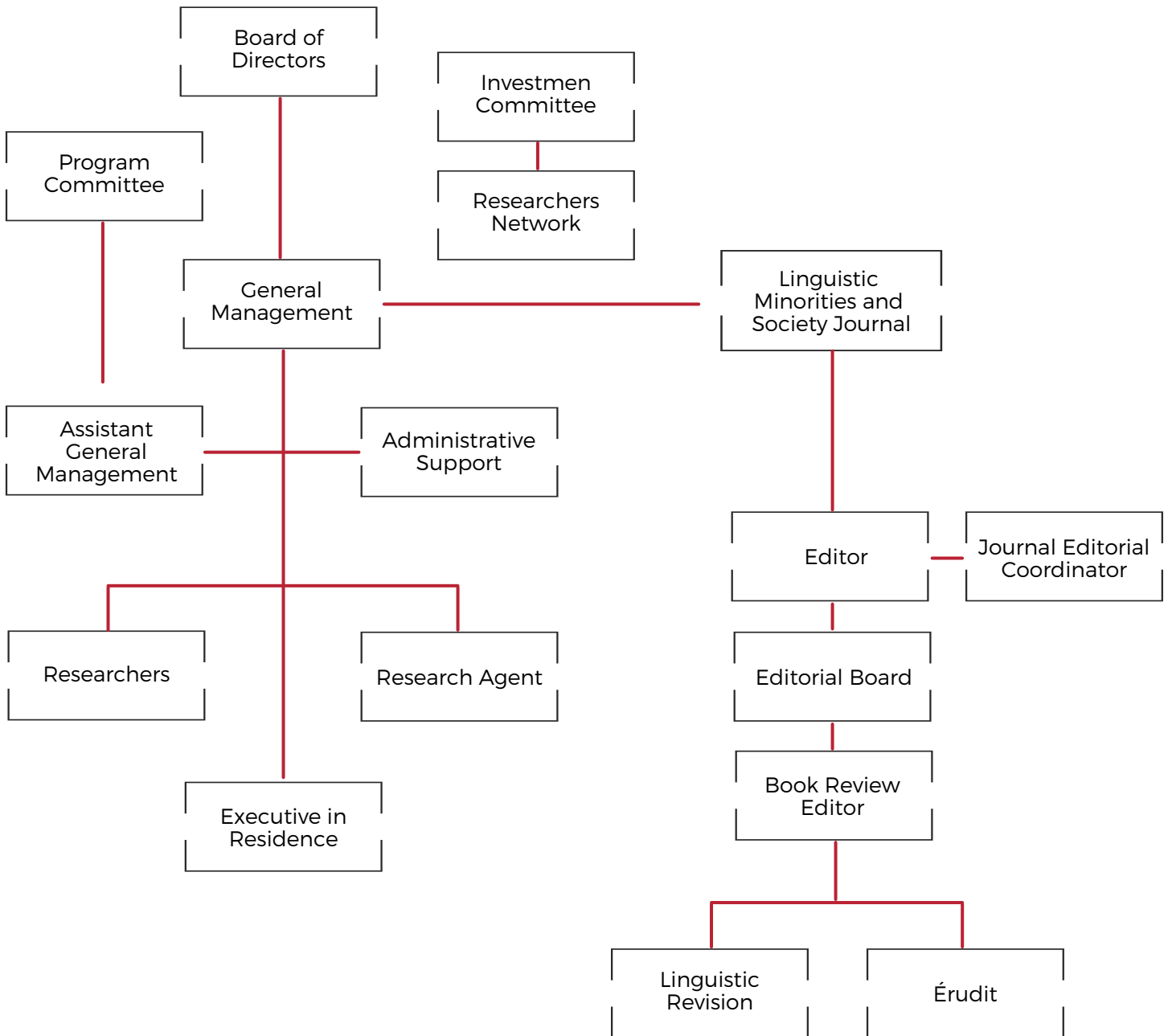
Upon reading our annual report, you can also consult our knowledge dissemination section, which includes our research reports, team participation in conferences and workshops, as well as consultations and committees.

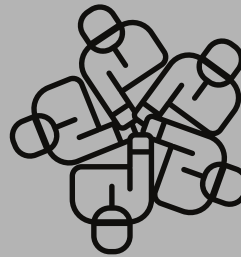

A portrait of the French-speaking population in the four Atlantic provinces was produced, based on the variable of knowledge of official languages. The portrait included 35 sociodemographic sheets and a detailed portrait for each of the RADARTS member broadcasters' regions. Based on Statistics Canada census data (2021), it presents certain sociodemographic, socioeconomic and sociolinguistic characteristics, with the aim of better identifying the hidden potential of the francophone and francophile audience. • **Financed by RADARTS**

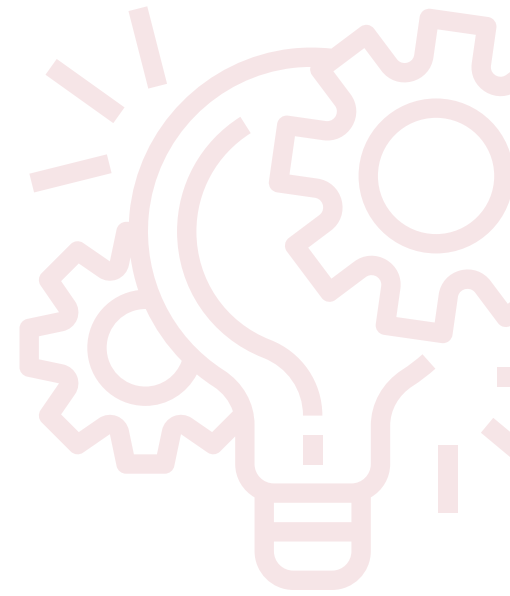
