RESEARCH PROJECT

CIRLM CARRIES OUT A NEW RESEARCH PROJECT

Title: *Les facteurs déterminant l'offre de services de santé en français* (available in French only)

This research project addresses the linguistic development of health care services within English or bilingual health care facilities in Canada. By identifying these facilities in a political and legal context, while considering organizational restraints and internal human resources, this project will provide an analysis of the factors determining the active offer of service in French. It will offer some useful insight to stakeholders who need to implement strategies for improving access to health care services by Francophones. The project will be carried out in four hospital centres located throughout four provinces: New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Ontario and Manitoba. Each hospital centre expressed an interest in this project and has accepted to take part in it.
